

This month's key message relates to

INVESTMENT FRAUD

What is Financial Investments fraud?

There are many different types of investment fraud. They usually involve criminals contacting people out of the blue and convincing them to invest in schemes or products that are worthless or do not exist. Once the criminals have received payment, they cease contact with the victim.

How to protect yourself from Financial Investment fraud: Investment opportunities: Don't be rushed into making an investment. Remember, legitimate organisations will never pressure you into investing on the spot. Where people have made investments, you should not have to pay money in continually to get money out. Fraudsters initially start by saying they need, say, £100 to withdraw the money - then £1,000 - then £10,000 and so it escalates very quickly.

<u>Always seek advice first:</u> Before making significant financial decisions, speak with trusted friends or family members, or seek professional independent advice.

<u>FCA register</u>: Use the Financial Conduct Authority's (FCA) register to check if the company is regulated by the FCA. If you deal with a firm (or individual) that isn't regulated, you may not be covered by the Financial Ombudsman Service (FOS) if things go wrong and you lose your money. What to do if you've been a victim of Financial Investment fraud: You could be targeted again: Fraudsters sometimes re-establish contact with previous victims claiming that they can help them recover lost money, this is just a secondary scam. Hang up on any callers that claim they can get your money back for you.

<u>Identity theft:</u> If you suspect your identity may have been stolen, you can check your credit rating

quickly and easily online. You should do this every few months anyway, using a reputable service provider and follow up on any unexpected or suspicious results.

Legal advice: In many cases of fraud there is a close correlation between what may be considered fraud and the civil tort of deceit and/or breach of contract, for which there are civil litigation options. You should always seek professional legal advice, or contact Citizens Advice to understand your options. You can also contact the Financial Conduct Authority's consumer helpline on 0800 111 6768 or report suspicious businesses or individuals by using the reporting form on their website.

Gentle reminder: Yes, we have put out messages about the WhatsApp scam before, but the public are still being targeted and losing money. Please continue to make family members and friends aware of this Scam, especially the elderly and vulnerable.

Take Five To Stop Fraud

<u>Stop:</u> Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

<u>Challenge:</u> Could it be fake? It's okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

<u>**Protect:**</u> If you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud online at actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040.

The Pavilion Report – Summer 2022

The Pavilon is open mornings Monday to Saturday, and afternoons when the Library is open.

<u>Pavilion Committee</u>. The parish council has now set up a standing committee to oversee the Pavilion management, with the Deputy Clerk managing the day to day running of the building alongside Anna Lawson (Building Assistant). The committee meetings will take place on the 3rd Monday of each month starting at 6.30pm, anybody welcome. The Agendas will be posted on the Council's website and notice-boards as with other committees.

<u>Carbon Audit</u>. Working to the Council's Climate Emergency Plan, a carbon audit of the building has been commissioned. The Council are working with Marches Energy Agency, with the aim of increasing efficiencies in the building, understanding the best way that the Pavilion can be less reliant on traditional electricity and increase the use of renewable energy.

The Pavilion has hosted two private hirings for christenings, a very colourful time was had by young & old, with bouncy castles inside and even an ice cream cyclist on the patio.

Following the sad news of Peter Traves, U3A members and friends gathered together to watch the funeral via an online link. U3A member, Doreen, said "It was good to see this community facility used in this way. Peter's funeral was very dignified and so many people shared this emotional occasion."



News from the Friends of Pontesbury Library

In July we mourned the sudden loss of our dear friend and supporter Peter Traves. Peter embodied all that a library represents within a community. He was a lifelong lover of books, of writing and learning, and he contributed in innumerable ways to the thriving library that we enjoy. His wife Merle is one of the Trustees of FOPL, and we share our deepest sympathies with her and her family. The Pavilion, where the Library is based, offered a sanctuary space for the local community when his funeral was live streamed, enabling those who could not attend in person to remember him together.

Also in July, Trustees of FOPL attended a meeting to discuss Shropshire Council's draft strategy for the future of library services across the county. The strategy acknowledges that the two things people value most in a library are the friendly, helpful staff, and unrestricted opening times. We certainly enjoy the former, and are very keen to keep the library open as much as we can. Shropshire Council are inevitably under constraints to make economies within the library service. In Pontesbury we are fortunate in having a very committed and engaged community to support the service both financially and practically, with many people volunteering quietly month after month to help with fundraising and providing refreshments for our monthly coffee mornings and other events. As a charity, we are committed to subsidising the council budget to the tune of £3,500 per year to

ensure our library stays open. Rawden Parslow from SC was encouraging in his praise of the way Pontesbury library operates; as a model it ensures we are somewhat protected against significant cuts in our service in the next few years, whereas other areas may be less fortunate. Our location in the Pavilion, where other community events also take place, is another factor that favours the continuation of the service, but we cannot afford to be complacent.

It is clear that we need to continue to nourish and grow our library – we welcome new volunteers for the committee and fundraising events, which are always fun and sociable occasions, and we do need a new Chair of Trustees. Repair Café - a great success! A wonderful group of volunteers turned up with sewing machines and threads, all sorts of tools and paraphernalia to fix whatever came in the door. It was a sunny day so a couple of repairs spilled outside. We had a range of items from a precious vase, a collectable 70 year old doll, a balance bike, an axe, a pick axe, a pressure jet washer, a disembodied toy wooden mule, some spectacles and a wobbly chair. The volunteers



did a great job managing to fix almost everything, which was fantastic. The aim was to save items from going into landfill and we certainly achieved that. The owners' faces were a delight, providing great reward to the volunteers. Reducing waste going to landfill is a good way to help the climate and the planet, which has limited resources.

Following this success we are aiming to hold our **next repair cafe on 10th September, the second Saturday in the month. Time: 10.00hrs to 14.00hrs in St George's church.**

Please come along as early as possible to give the volunteers chance to repair your item within that time. If you have clothes with holes or tears or a hem that needs rescuing, broken wooden items, possibly even simple bike repairs (spare parts will be a limiting factor) bring them along. Our wonderful volunteers would love to fix your items and extend it's life for you.

Enormous thanks to all the volunteers that were there at the first repair cafe plus those that have offered their time and skills for the next ones. Flower Club The July Flower club meeting was a workshop on arranging foam free as there is increasing awareness of the environmental cost of floral foam, which is a single-use plastic and it won't break down or degrade, and arrangers are wondering how to arrange without it. Our member and demonstrator, Penelope Harrison showed how easy it is to create alternative mechanics. She started with the good old reliable chicken wire and how to prepare a support which could be placed in a vase. This was brought up to date with an example using square wire mesh to form a more contemporary support. Her next example had a slice of tree trunk sitting over a glass vase, she had previously drilled random holes through the wood into which she placed a variety of flowers to produce an ethereal statement arrangement. The next arrangement used a triangle of twigs, infilled with a wire grid placed over a vase, which supported a tepee of contorted willow. Using the two provided surprisingly firm support, with the contorted

willow adding to the arrangement . She then used small sections of willow bent at different levels within a vase to make a grid, as flower stems were added through the grid, the arrangement became firmer. She also showed how to use one of the new types of biodegradable foam made from basalt rock which is spun into wool-like fibres.

It was then time for everyone to have a go at creating their own arrangement using one (or a mixture) of the methods. Everyone got stuck in and found that with a bit of adjusting, a wonderful arrangement could be made without damaging the planet. We were also able to have a go at using the biodegradable foam. It proved to be a fun and informative evening.


Notes from the hill

With the warm weather seen this year it has certainly been good for making hay and all of ours is safely gathered in and we even have some to spare if anyone wants to buy some small bales. However, the hay making this year has not been without some excitement.

We always wait until after mid-July to make hay to avoid damaging any nesting birds and often leave it a bit longer to allow more flowers to set seed, however this year we had the added complication of Curlew Country's head-started birds being released close by. With images of the worst scenario, of all of their carefully reared birds hunkering down in our hay fields as cutting started, we had our meadows cut as early as possible after mid-July so that there wouldn't be any casualties.

We also had a number of people wanting some of the hay to be used as green hay. This is where it is taken to other sites, straight after cutting, to drop seed and help other meadows become flower rich, and on top of that I had a few scything courses and a scything competition where we needed some grass to cut.

This staggered cutting of the hay was nice to do as it leaves some of the later flowering plants to set seed and this would have been the case in the days when farmers used to cut their meadows by scythe and work around the weather. Today with modern machinery a hay meadow is cut in minutes, whereas in the past it could be over a whole summer. At home, in the meadow that was once my lawn, I have delayed cutting it because I have been seeing a small flock of goldfinches enjoying the knapweed seeds every evening and I didn't want to remove the food that they were appreciating so much.



This is true for many plants that we tend to tidy away at this time of year as they become tall and dry, but if you can leave an area of the garden untidy over winter it can be a great home for all kinds of wildlife, from pupating moths and butterflies to voles and frogs.



As I write this we are in the grip of another heatwave. This has been good for some of the butterflies with gatekeepers, ringlets and skippers being commonly seen, and we have even rediscovered a small colony of grayling at the north of the hill.

The hot weather, however, brings with it the worry of wildfires. These hot spells seem to be an increasing trend and I urge everyone to be vigilant against fires and barbeques and to ring the emergency services if there are any signs of fire on or near the hill.
